



The ZoomLink-MLxS radio system can be a great help to a hearing aid user – a little of your time to help understand what does what will be much appreciated.



The tutor wears the ZoomLink radio microphone to pick up their voice, the student wears an MLxS radio receiver to feed sound directly into their hearing aid. The result is a greatly improved and relaxed listening experience for the hearing aid user.

There is no need to be self conscious in wearing a radio microphone – all the best TV stars do so.

The lavalier cord is also the aerial, but please note – if it is long enough to go over your head, it will sit too low to give good sound quality to a hearing aid user. Adjust by squeezing front pad and pulling the free end of the cord.

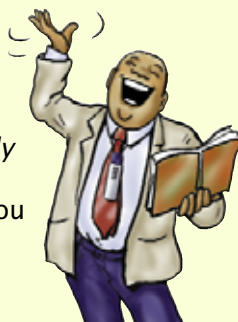


6 information points

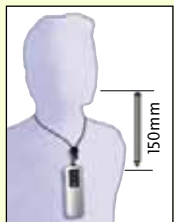
1 The student should give you the ZoomLink transmitter turned on and ready to use – if you can see the display then the unit is on.



4 During the lesson the ZoomLink will *automatically* adjust to louder voice levels so you need not change the way you normally talk.



2 Microphone should be positioned about the length of a biro from the mouth.



5 During the lesson try not to draw attention to the hearing aid user but do help them by always repeating questions from the floor.

3 Avoid wearing 'noisy' clinking jewellery.



6 Be aware that you have a direct sound link to MLxS users in the room and turning off the transmitter when you are talking to others.

Mic mode: The user themselves should tell you which microphone mode to select and when.

Super zoom – Display: Normally only for handheld use in noisy room to hear somebody close by.

Zoom – Display: Normally for handheld use to hear somebody across a table or group.

Omni – Display: Usual setting when neck worn.

The battery status is shown in the display and a flat battery is shown as an empty battery icon.



The ZoomLink needs daily charging.

Connection facilities into AV equipment are available, please discuss your requirements with your audiology support contact.



After the lesson, if you are not returning the transmitter to the user, remember to turn it off before going to the staff room or toilet!
